Sermon Title: Jesus the Passover Lamb

Scripture: Exodus 3:1-15, Exodus 12:21-32

MAIN IDEA: In the book of Exodus the nation of Israel is saved by the passover lamb. In todays world, Jesus is our Passover Lamb, by His wounds we are healed.

OUTLINE:

- 1. The Israelites became slaves in Egypt.
- 2. God raised up Moses to set His people free.
- 3. The Lord used plagues to fight Pharaoh and bring Egypt to its knees.
- 4. The final plague took the life of all the first born sons in Egypt, however God offered a way for the Israelites to be saved. The Lord offered the passover lamb.
- 5. The main takeaways from Exodus are: Moses relied on God to fight Pharaoh. The Lords name I AM is Holy and should be cherished. Jesus is our ultimate Passover Lamb who takes away the sin of the world.

DISCUSSION GUIDE

- 1. The Israelites were stuck as slaves in Egypt, describe a time in your life you were stuck somewhere you did not want to be. (emotionally or physically)
- 2. The Israelites went to Egypt and had a pretty bad travel experience, to say the least. Have you ever traveled to a place that you would never want to go back to?
- 3. This week the worship team introduced us to a new song called "Trust In God." Do you find it hard to trust God when you are in the middle of fighting your Pharaoh?
- 4. What steps can a believer take to have Jesus fight for you?
- 5. How can we as believers depend on Jesus in all circumstances?
- 6. This week we learned that Jesus' name is Holy. What is one way you can cherish the name of Jesus?
- 7. Jesus is our Passover Lamb. Why is it essential for every believer to understand this Biblical truth?

- 8. How do you "dwell in the grace of the Passover Lamb?" What does that physically look like in the life of a believer?
- 9. Jesus is the only way to heaven. Why is it important for a believer to share that biblical truth? Do you personally have a hard time sharing this with others?
- 10. How can we be specifically praying for you tonight and throughout the rest of the week?
