Sermon Title: What You Must Know to Tame the Tongue

Main Scripture: James 3:1-12

OUTLINE

- 1. The tongue, which no human can control, disproportionately reveals the inconsistency of the human heart.
- 2. We must tame the tongue but no human can.
- 3. Jesus bore the judgment for every sinful word our tongues have spoken and empowers us to speak truth in love.
- 4. In humility, acknowledge your inconsistency and inability to control your tongue. Seek the Spirit's help, which He gladly gives to those who seek Him.
 - 1. Repent: Recognize that speech sins are heart sins (Luke 6:45). Repent for careless, critical, manipulative, or prideful words. Acknowledge that ungodly speech flows from a heart in need of transformation.
 - 2. Revere: Approach teaching and public speech with reverence. Honor the weight of words, particularly in spiritual leadership, knowing we will give an account (Jas. 3:1; Matt. 12:36).
 - 3. Restrain: Learn the discipline of silence, careful listening, and thoughtful speech. Bridle the tongue not in legalistic restraint but in the Spirit's strength (Prov. 17:27–28; Jas. 1:19).
 - 4. Reform: Actively replace destructive words with constructive ones. Speak blessing instead of cursing, truth instead of slander, gentleness instead of wrath. This is not merely moral effort, but gospel application (Eph. 4:29–32).
 - 5. Renew: Let your daily speech become a site of sanctification. Practice confession when words fail. Use words to heal, not to harm; to honor, not to humiliate. Join God in His redemptive work by speaking life in a world of verbal death (Phil. 2:14–16; Col. 3:16).
 - 6. Rest in Christ: Ultimately, transformation comes not by tongue control alone but by heart renewal. Fix your eyes on Jesus, the Word who saves and sanctifies, and submit to the Spirit's ongoing work.

- 5. What does the spring/fig tree imagery reveal about inner transformation?
- 6. What connection do you see between heart and speech (Luke 6:45)?
- 7. How does this passage expose our need for Christ?
- 8. Review the 6 "Rs" for our response. Discuss how you need to apply these in your own heart & life.
